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1	PROCEEDINGS	
2	MR. EAVES: Come on in, everybody.	
3	Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen. I'm	
4	John Eaves. I'm Chairman of the National Coal Council.	
5	The twice-postponed Fall 2012 meeting of the	
6	full Council is now called to order.	
7	Today's meeting is the most unique in 28	
8	years of the Council's history. It is the only meeting	
9	that has been postponed twice. It is the only meeting	
10	to be held in a different year than it was actually	
11	approved in. But finally we are here, guys, and we are	
12	excited about getting started.	
13	The agenda for today's meeting will be a	
14	little bit different from the traditional full	
15	Council's agenda, in the fact that we are not going to	
16	have any outside speakers and we are going to focus	
17	just on Council business today.	
18	But before we get into the agenda, I'd like	
19	to recognize Bob Wright of DOE's Energy Fossil Fuel.	
20	Bob came from Pittsburgh today on a pretty tight	
21	schedule. And, Bob, we really do appreciate you being	
22	here.	

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1	This meeting is being held in accordance with	
2	the Federal Advisory Committee Act and the regulations	
3	that govern that Act.	
4	Our meeting is open to the public. I'd like	
5	to welcome guests from the public who have joined us	
6	here today. An opportunity will be provided for the	
7	guests to make comments at the end of the meeting.	
8	Full and complete minutes of this meeting are	
9	being made, as well as a verbatim transcript.	
10	Therefore, it is important that you use the microphone	
11	when you wish to speak, and you begin by stating your	
12	name and affiliation.	
13	Council members have been provided a copy of	
14	the agenda for today's meeting. I would appreciate a	
15	motion for the adoption of the agenda.	
16	MR. HARRISON: So moved.	
17	MR. EAVES: Second?	
18	MS. WALTON: Second.	
19	MR. EAVES: All in favor?	
20	(Chorus of ayes.)	
21	Opposed?	
22	(No response.)	

- 1 Thank you. At this point, I'd like to call up our
- 2 Finance Chair, Greg Workman, to review the audit. After
- 3 that, we'll have Larry Grimes come up and talk about
- 4 Council bylaws as well as some of the proposed
- 5 legislation that's out there. Greg?
- 6 MR. WORKMAN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. My
- 7 name is Greg Workman, and I serve as the Chairman of
- 8 the Finance Committee of the National Coal Council. I
- 9 will now report on the Finance Committee meeting that
- 10 was held jointly by telephone conference call on May
- 11 7th with the Executive Committee.
- 12 At that meeting, the Finance Committee
- 13 accepted the 2012 audit report from the Council's
- 14 auditors, Chaconas & Wilson. Following the action of
- 15 the Finance Committee, the Executive Committee also
- 16 accepted that report. I am happy to say that the
- 17 Council received a clean determination.
- I would like to take this time to publicly
- 19 thank all of the members who have paid their 2013
- 20 duties. I ask that those who have not paid to do so as
- 21 soon as possible. The financial state of the Council
- 22 continues to be stable, but only because the membership

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has been generous and timely in their support. 2 The financial problems faced by many in our country, and indeed around the world, continue to challenge that stability. If we all do our part, the 5 Council will have the necessary financial resources to continue to effectively carry out its mission. 6 7 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That concludes my 8 report. 9 MR. EAVES: At this point, we will have Larry Grimes come up and talk about the Council's bylaws as 10 well as some of the proposed legislation that is out 11 12 there on FACA. Larry? 13 MR. GRIMES: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. is going to be short and sweet. Before the group today 15 is a proposed restatement and amendment of the bylaws of the National Coal Council, Inc. It has been since 17 1975 that we have had -- we haven't had a revision of 18 these bylaws since 1995, excuse me, and the reason it 19 is being proposed today is because, even though we are 20 not proposing any substantive changes, the old bylaws 21 are rather dogged-eared and they have some stickers 22 hanging out for things that were adopted priorly, and

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1	it is just a good idea every 20 years or so to do this.	
2	I represent to you that there are no	
3	substantive changes. They are a technical amendment	
4	which has to do with the titles to conform to Virginia	
5	law. But, Mr. Chairman, I would recommend that the	
6	Advisory Committee that this Committee accept this	
7	amendment. And we need a motion and a second.	
8	MR. HARRISON: So moved.	
9	MR. GRIMES: Clark.	
10	MS. WALTON: Second.	
11	MR. EAVES: All in favor?	
12	(Chorus of ayes.)	
13	MR. GRIMES: Who was our second? Kathy?	
14	All right. This is available in everybody's	
15	packet, and you are welcome to call me if you have any	
16	questions about this.	
17	The other thing I have been asked to talk a	
18	little bit about and it will be very brief there	
19	is a proposed amendment to the Federal Advisory	
20	Committee Act, FACA, which is our Bible, in the House	
21	of Representatives. This is bill H.R. 1104.	
22	We, as the Coal Council, have no standing to	

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- 1 lobby to Congress. In fact, we are prohibited from
- 2 doing so, so we are not taking any formal position on
- 3 this. If you have interest in this piece of
- 4 legislation, I suggest you contact one of the members
- 5 here because many of the members here are interested in
- 6 the outcome of this legislation.
- 7 Mr. Chairman, I would entertain questions,
- 8 but I think that probably covers it.
- 9 MR. EAVES: Any questions? Yes.
- 10 MR. GRIMES: Name and affiliation, please.
- 11 You have to use the microphone.
- MS. MIGDEN-OSTRANDER: Janine Migden-
- 13 Ostrander, Regulatory Assistance Project. What does
- 14 this new bill do? What are the issues that are in play
- 15 here that you were referencing?
- 16 MR. GRIMES: The bill basically addresses the
- 17 nominating process; that is, the process for the
- 18 secretary to choose the members. It also increases the
- 19 burden on the Department of Energy in its reporting
- 20 burdens. It creates a de facto membership for people
- 21 who are not actually members but like to come to
- 22 meetings, like to participate in our studies, and so

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1	forth. So that is generally what it does.	
2	It is far-reaching. You all ought to	
3	probably inform yourself about it. But since we don't	
4	have standing to challenge it or to even comment on it	
5	publicly, we are not going to do that.	
6	MALE SPEAKER: What was the number again?	
7	MR. GRIMES: H.R. 1104. It has cleared the	
8	first subcommittee, as I understand it, by a voice	
9	vote. But I don't think on the surface it is not	
10	readily understandable. But if you dig into it, you	
11	can see what is going on there. All right?	
12	Mr. Chairman, that's all I have.	
13	MR. EAVES: Any other questions for Larry?	
14	(No response.)	
15	MR. GRIMES: Thank you very much.	
16	MR. EAVES: Thanks, Larry.	
17	You know, we said this was going to be a	
18	short meeting, but I did want to take a moment today	
19	is a bittersweet day for the National Coal Council.	
20	You know, the sweet part is that we have got Janet	
21	Gellici coming in as our new Chief Operating Officer.	
22	You all know Janet. She spent over 30 years as CEO of	

- 1 the American Coal Council and has driven significant
- 2 success of that organization, so we are thrilled to
- 3 have Janet joining us effectively today.
- 4 You know, the bitter part of today is that we
- 5 are saying goodbye to a friend. About a year ago Bob
- 6 came to me and he said, "You know, John, I'm ready to
- 7 retire." You know, I was certainly disappointed to
- 8 hear that from Bob, but I understood. He is ready to
- 9 start the next chapter in his life. He has been with
- 10 us for over 15 years. I think he said 15 years and two
- 11 weeks, right, Bob?
- 12 So the things that this guy has done for this
- 13 organization, the passion, the focus that he has had,
- 14 you know, is really to be commended. He has always had
- 15 the National Coal Council in his interest. He has
- 16 always been focused on the coal industry, and he has
- 17 really been an advocate for what we are trying to do.
- 18 And if you think about the last 15 years, and all of
- 19 the changes that we've seen, this guy has been through
- 20 a lot.
- 21 And, you know, Bob has decided that he wants
- 22 to spend a little more time with his wife Marilyn, his

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- 1 kids, his grandkids, a little more time in Arizona,
- 2 hopefully working on his handicap. And I think it's
- 3 all up to us to continue to monitor that to make sure
- 4 that he is making progress with his handicap.
- 5 But Bob, you know, I do, on behalf of the
- 6 Council, want to thank you for everything you've done.
- 7 I want to thank you personally for everything you've
- 8 helped me with over the last couple of years. I mean,
- 9 you've been a real trooper in difficult times, and we
- 10 really do appreciate it.
- 11 At this point, I'd like to call David Surber
- 12 up. He is going to read a letter for us, and then I'll
- 13 get back up and say a couple more words, and then maybe
- 14 we'll allow Bob to get up and say a few things. David?
- 15 MR. SURBER: Mr. Chairman, friends and
- 16 colleagues on the National Coal Council -- Bob, could
- 17 you come up? I have something for you. I will tell
- 18 you as he is approaching --
- MR. BECK: I'm not sure I want to.
- 20 (Laughter.)
- 21 MR. SURBER: Please. It will bring no harm
- 22 to you, I assure you.

(Laughter.) 1 Bob is from Cincinnati, and his wife Marilyn is from my In fact, she was born just six blocks from where I live. And so Bob is a Kentuckian by association and incorporation, if you will. 5 6 I was talking with our Governor, Governor Steve Beshear, just a few weeks ago, and I said, "Governor, Bob Beck is retiring," and he said, "Who is 9 Bob Beck?" 10 (Laughter.) And I said, "Governor, Bob Beck, the head of the 11 National Coal" -- "Oh, that Bob Beck. Oh, yes. 12 13 to him frequently. He has been a big help to us." said, "Now, he is retiring and we want to do something 15 special for him." And he said, "Well, you know, Dave, we're cutting back on employees here, and if you're 17 looking for a contract job or something, there is just 18 not much I can do." 19 And I said, "I don't think he's looking for 20 additional work." I said, "But there is one thing that 21 is within your province to do, that only you can do." He says, "You want me to make him a Kentucky Colonel," 22

13 and I said, "Yes." So in the name of Governor Beshear, I present to you this handsome plaque commissioning The Honorable Robert A. Beck as a member of the Order of Kentucky Colonels." 6 (Applause.) MR. GRIMES: You know, Bob, while you're up here, again, on behalf of the Council, I wanted to give you a small token of our appreciation. It really recognizes what you've done for this organization, and 10 what you've done for the coal industry over the last 15 11 We really do appreciate it, and we are going to 12 13 miss you. So hit it long and straight. 14 (Applause.) Thanks. I actually also went to 15 MR. BECK: school -- I went to college at Thomas More College, the 17 same alma mater as David did, in Kentucky, and I spent 18 a fair amount of time there. And my older son, Bart, is a lieutenant on the police force in Ludlow, 19 20 Kentucky, which is literally right across the river 21 from Cincinnati. So don't drive very fast in Ludlow. 22 But I do appreciate the Kentucky Colonel

part. I grew up there, so it's -- that is really special, and I greatly appreciate it. This thing, though, I'm not sure. (Laughter.) But, and I will be brief because I have given many 5 speeches, and generally there are two really bad places to give those speeches. One is at 11:30 in the morning, and one is at 4:30 in the afternoon, because you are right before lunch or you are right before the 10 cocktail hour. I have come to know that the 4:30 one 11 is by far the worst. 12 So I'm not going to slow us down from getting 13 to the reception, but it has been 15 years and two weeks of some of the greatest opportunity and 15 productivity in my career. And I appreciate all the help, all the support, that every member over those 15 17 years has provided to the Council. 18 As I always tell people, I'm just staff. Ιt 19 is your Council. Your name goes on those reports. And 20 we have had some tremendous support from some 21 incredible individuals, some just extremely intelligent people, and I think we have shifted the needle on coal

15 over that time, not because of me but because of you, and I thank you all for it. (Applause and standing ovation.) MR. EAVES: You know, as we mentioned, this meeting is authorized and open to the public. The 5 public can submit comments to the Department of Energy. Also, if they wish, they can speak. So those who wish to speak may do so at this time. Do we have anybody who would like to speak? 10 (No response.) Seeing none, let me close by announcing that we will 11 hold the Spring 2013 full Council meeting right here 12 tomorrow morning at 9:00. And with that, if there is 13 no other business to come before the Council, we stand 15 adjourned. 16 Thank you. I promised you it would be short. 17 (Whereupon, at 4:21 p.m., the Council 18 meeting was adjourned.) 19 20 21 22
